3. Focus Areas

a. Postsecondary

- Idaho Panel on Higher Education Digital Badge Governance April 25th 10 am
 - 1. Panel includes national leaders from CU Boulder, Wichita State, Alamo Colleges, and UMBC.
 - 2. Discussion will center on badging governance, development processes, and industry connections.
 - 3. Brainstorm additional questions
 - a. Questions for panelists:
 - i. Please introduce yourselves and give a brief background on digital badging at your institution including whether your badges are issued for academic credit or non-credit — or part of a credit-bearing course and where is your digital badging program housed?
 - ii. What is the WHY of your badging program and what advice would you give a university or college just starting out in creating a digital badging program?
 - iii. What is an example of a successful digital badge on your campus?
 - iv. Who are the essential campus stakeholders that need to be included when developing a badging platform?
 - v. What is the process on your campus for how a badge is created? Does it have to go through any formal approval or review process? Is a curriculum committee or registrar involved in your badge creation process?
 - vi. How do you make sure badges are connected to industry needs or the career needs of the students?
 - b. Additional Questions Suggested:
 - i. How do institutions work with employers who actively use badges in hiring?
 - ii. What are the ways students share badges with employers?
 - iii. How are badges positioned on resumes or in job applications?

- ii. Attended virtual Dental Assisting open house at DTEC shared information about SkillStack® Recruit and shared information with their Technical Advisory Board.
 - 1. Rick presented to employers and TAC members.
- c. Corrections Badging
 - i. What do we want to know about Corrections badging?
 - 1. Ted Oparnico suggested aligning SkillStack® with national recognition like NCCER credentials, ensuring portability post-incarceration.
 - ii. We can give a presentation about Corrections badging at next IMAC
 - Possible future subcommittee meeting to dive deeper, including contacts from Arkansas and Oklahoma corrections systems.

 - Financial Literacy badge launched for Financial Literacy month in April
 - 1. Mixed reactions
 - Feedback noted that some teachers felt overwhelmed by large student rosters.
 - Consideration needed for whether to allow all grade levels to earn badges or maintain focus on capstone courses.
 - c. Suggestion to develop clearer processes and possibly assign control to administrators.
 - d. Connect Conference session planned to review findings.
 - ii. What does IMAC want to know to help move this discussion forward.

Happy Financial Literacy Month!

As we kick off National Financial Literacy Month, Idaho Division of Career Technical Education developed a new Personal Financial Literacy badge in SkillStack®. **This is an optional badge** as we are expanding SkillStack® beyond capstone teachers and piloting introductory and intermediate courses. Teachers using the personal financial literacy ISEE codes now have access to this badge.

What are Microcredentials and Digital Badges?

<u>SkillStack®</u> is Idaho's micro credentialing platform. Micro credentials are recognized credentials awarded to learners for mastery of skills or concepts defined by industry and educators. Each microcredential is represented by a digital badge, which learners can use to build a portfolio and showcase their achievements for employment or education opportunities.

When the students meet the **nine competencies** for the Personal Financial Literacy graduation requirement students will be eligible to earn this badge.
